

#### Required Elements in a Wedding Ceremony

The Marriage Act of Ontario requires that certain formalities be observed between the parties, as marriage is a legal agreement enacted during a wedding ceremony, whether the couple is getting married in their backyard for a small ceremony, or in a banquet hall for a large one. Wedding ceremonies may be informal or formal, simple or elaborate, but the following parts must be included if the couple wants their marriage to be legal in Ontario.

#### 1. Officiant Introduction

The Officiant introduces self by name, as a licensed representative of the government, and announces the reason for assembling together for the wedding of the couple getting married.

## 2. Affirmations of Intent to Marry

The Officiant asks the partners if they are there willingly, that they know of no legal impediment to being married, and that they are ready to enter into a legal marriage at this time with each other. Partners must publicly affirm their willingness to be married and their acceptance of their partner as their spouse.

#### 3. Declaration of Marriage

The Officiant publicly states that a contract has been entered into by these two people and that and by the power vested in them by either the Province of Ontario, or the Registrar General, the couple is officially declared married.

## 4. Signing of the Documents

The Officiant, the couple and their two witnesses, must sign these official marriage documents as follows: • MARRIAGE LICENCE (obtained by the couple from any Ontario city hall in order to get married) • MARRIAGE REGISTER (the book the Officiant brings to record every marriage solemnized) • RECORD OF SOLEMNIZATION (the portion of the licence that the couple keeps after marriage)

## Optional Elements in a Wedding Ceremony

The exchange of wedding rings and the inclusion of music, poems, candles, flowers, readings, and other rituals, although traditional, are in fact, optional.

You may write and read your own vows—either in print format or after being read by the Officiant, or just say "I Do" after being read by the Officiant.

At any point during the ceremony, you may address the assembled guest themselves, or ask a friend or family member to offer readings, sing or play music, or make any another meaningful contribution.

The tone can be formal, informal, humorous, romantic, family-oriented, or anything you wish, as long as the required elements are included.

I have included samples of introductions, vows, rituals, readings and other ideas, to assist you in choosing optional elements to personalize each ceremony and making each unique to you.

## Officiant Introduction (required)

Here are examples of introductions that can be stated by the Officiant. Feel free to use any of these introductions, or write your own, or mix and match them.

## **Opening Words**

Opening words are optional, but are often used to set the tone for the rest of the ceremony. These are usually read by the Officiant, however, a friend, or relative may do so. Poems, quotes, or book excerpts are often chosen as opening words.

## Opening 1

# Acknowledgement of Guests and Family

It is usually appropriate and considerate to acknowledge the guests during a wedding ceremony. Here are some sample statements that may be used for this purpose.

| Acknowledgement 1: Parents (may be used if parents are present)  |

#### Ceremonial Readings

Readings are optional, but can help personalize the ceremony for the couple. One or more of the following samples, or any other of your choosing, may be used. Readings may be performed by the Officiant or any other person chosen by the couple. Consider asking someone in attendance to do a reading. Readings may be included throughout the ceremony.

#### Reading 1

We are gathered here to join this couple in marriage. This is an act as ancient as the history of the human race and as new as each new morning; for it speaks of the past and of the future, of the life of the individual and the existence of the community. Because marriage is concerned with the most fundamental of human relationships, it must not be regarded lightly. Those who enter into this relationship shall cherish for each other a mutual esteem and love, bear each other's infirmities and weaknesses, comfort each other in sickness, trouble and sorrow, encourage each other in trials of the spirit, and live together as the heirs of life. Marriage is to be entered into with devotion, respect and discretion. Love and loyalty will be the foundation of a happy and enduring home. And if the solemn vows you are about to make be kept with honour and integrity, your life will be full of peace and joy, and the home you are establishing will be one of warmth and understanding.

# Reading 2

We are gathered together in front of family and friends, to join you in marriage. You shall give to each other a vow, lovingly and with love, you will testify before us the blending of your ways and the wedding of your hearts. You have come before us to enter into that estate of marriage, which is a time-honoured tradition. People must enter into it freely, sincerely, and soberly, and in the joy that comes to those who truly love.

## Reading 3

When you love someone you do not love him or her all the time, exactly the same way from moment to moment, it is impossible. It is even a lie to pretend to. Yet this is exactly what most of us demand. We have so little trust in the ebb and flow of life, of love, and of relationships, we leap at the flow of the tide, and resist in terror its ebb. We insist on permanency, on duration, on continuity, when the only continuity possible, in life, as in love, is in growth, in fluidity, in freedom—in the sense that the dancers are free, barely touching as they pass, but partners in the same pattern. For relationships, too, must be like islands. We must accept them for what they are here and now, within their limits—islands, surrounded and interrupted by the sea, and continually visited and abandoned by the tides. One must accept the security of the winged life and the ebb and flow of intermittency.

# Reading 4 (with children)

# Reading 5

Marriage is in many ways a simplification of life and it naturally combines the strengths and wills of two people so that, together, they seem to reach farther into the future than they did before. Above all, marriage is a new task and a new demand on the strength and generosity of each partner. The point of marriage is not to create a quick commonality by tearing down all boundaries; on the contrary, a good marriage is one in which each partner appoints the other to be the guardian of his solitude, and thus they show each other the greatest possible trust. Those who love must act as if they had a great work to accomplish: they must be much alone and go into themselves and gather and concentrate themselves; they must work; they must become something.

## Reading 6

The quiet thoughts of two people a long time in love touch lightly like birds nesting in each other's warmth, you will know them by their laughter. However, to each other they speak mostly through their solitude. If they find themselves apart, they may dream of sitting undisturbed in each other's presence, of wrapping themselves warmly in each other's ease. As each autumn, when the trees shed their leaves to prepare for the next spring's growth and fruit, may each year also bring closure, shedding the spent and bringing rebirth to the spirit of your marriage. Look toward the future, for in it lies the creative power for your own lives. May you grow together like flowers and grass, and may your life be a dance to the music of love.

## Reading 7 "On Marriage" ~ Khalil Gibran

Love one another, but make not a bond of love: Let it rather be a moving sea between the shores of your souls. Fill each other's cup but drink not from one cup. Give one another of your bread but eat not from the same piece Sing and dance together and be joyous, but let each one of you be alone, Even as the strings of a lute are alone though they quiver with the same music. Give your hearts, but not into each other's keeping. For only the hand of Life can contain your hearts. And stand together, yet not too near together: For the pillars of the temple stand apart, And the oak tree and the cypress grow not in each other's shadow.

## Reading 8

Love today, learn from yesterday and prepare for tomorrow. Nothing happens without a cause. The union of these two people has not come accidently but came about through love, respect and caring. This tie therefore has been carefully forged and will not easily be broken or resolved. Although the future will bring difficult as well as happy times, their love their experience and their preparation for tomorrow will make it possible to meet challenges and joy together. Saying the words is easy, but to build upon respect, understanding, and learn from past experience, will make this marriage firm and lasting.

# Reading 9 "Love - Definition And Philosophy"

## Reading 10 "Marriage – A Promise of Love"

Marriage is a commitment to life and to the best that two people can find and bring out of each other. It offers opportunities for sharing and growth no other human relationship can equal—a physical and emotional joining that is promised for a lifetime. Within the circle of its love, marriage encompasses all of life's most important relationships. The two partners are each other's best friend, confidante, lover, teacher, listener, and critic. There may come times when one partner is heartbroken or ailing, and the love of the other may resemble the tender caring of a parent for a child. Marriage deepens and enriches every facet of life. Happiness is fuller, memories are fresher, commitments are stronger, even is felt more strongly, and passes away more quickly. Marriage understands and forgives the mistakes life is unable to avoid. It encourages and nurtures new life, new experiences, and new ways of expressing love through the seasons of life. When two people pledge to love and care for each other in marriage, they create a bond unique to themselves, which binds them closer than any spoken or written words. Marriage is a promise, a potential, made in the hearts of two people who love, and that love takes a lifetime to fulfill.

# Reading 11 "What is Love?" ~ Susan Polis Schutz

Love is the strongest feeling known—an all-encompassing passion, an extreme strength, an overwhelming excitement. Love is trying not to hurt the other person, trying not to change the other person, trying not to dominate the other person, and trying not to deceive the other person. Love is understanding each other, listening to each other, supporting each other, and having fun with each other. Love is not an excuse to stop growing, not an excuse to stop making yourself better, not an excuse to lessen one's goals, and not an excuse to take the other person for granted. Love is being honest with each other, finding dreams to share, working towards common goals, and sharing responsibilities. Everyone in the world wants to love. Love is not a feeling to be taken lightly. Love is a feeling to be cherished, nurtured and cared for. Love is the reason for life.

## Reading 12 "A History of Love" ~ Diane Ackerman

"Love. What a small word we use for an idea so immense and powerful. It has altered the flow of history, calmed monsters, kindled works of art, cheered the forlorn, turned tough guys to mush, consoled the enslaved, driven strong women mad, glorified the humble, fuelled national scandals, bankrupted robber barons, and made mincemeat of kings. How can love's spaciousness be conveyed in the narrow confines of one syllable? Love is an ancient delirium, a desire older than civilization, with taproots spreading into deep and mysterious days. The heart is a living museum. In each of its galleries, no matter how narrow or dimly lit, preserved forever like wondrous diatoms, are our moments of loving, and being loved."

#### Reading 13 What is Love? (modified version of 1 Corinthians 13:4-8)

Love is always patient and kind. It is never jealous. Love is never boastful or conceited. It is never rude or selfish. It does not take offence and is not resentful. Love takes no pleasure in other people's faults, but delights in the truth. It is always ready to excuse, to trust, to hope. It is always ready to endure whatever comes. Finally, true love does not come to an end.

#### Reading 14 Excerpt from "Captain Corelli's Mandolin" ~ Louis de Bernières

Love is a temporary madness; it erupts like volcanoes and then subsides. And when it subsides you have to make a decision. You have to work out whether your roots have so entwined together that it is inconceivable that you should ever part. Because this is what love is. Love is not breathlessness, it is not excitement, it is not the promulgation of eternal passion. That is just being in love, which any fool can do. ## Personal Wedding Vows

Personal vows can be said in three different ways:

- 1. The Officiant reads the vows and the partners each answer "I Do" (for those couples who are not fond of the "repeat after me" approach)
- 2. The Officiant reads the vows line by line and the partners repeat them to each other.
- 3. Partners read their vows to each other from a piece of paper or card (their own or chosen from vows supplied by the Officiant) Note: The vows do not have to be the same for both partners. They can mix and match.

#### **Exchange of Wedding Rings**

Although not required, exchanging wedding rings is a traditional part of most weddings. Statements about the significance of this ritual, or the rings themselves, precede the exchange.

#### **Rings Introduction 1**

The exchange of wedding rings is a centuries-old wedding tradition. It signifies the neverending love between two spouses and also serves as an affirmation of the vows exchanged between them during their marriage ceremony.

The wedding ring is the most ancient of all wedding customs. Nearly every civilization has used the wedding ring as a symbol of the marriage agreement. May these rings you give and receive today symbolize your love and always remind each of you of this special day.

# Signing of the Marriage Documents (required)

Before the ceremony can be completed, the couple, their two witnesses, and the Officiant, must sign the legal documents. They all sign the Marriage Licence and the Marriage Register, and the witness and Officiant also sign the Record of Solemnization.

Partner A signs: Marriage Licence and Marriage Register

Partner B signs: Marriage Licence and Marriage Register

Witness for Partner A signs: Marriage Licence, Marriage Register, and Record of Solemnization

Witness for Partner B signs: Marriage Licence, Marriage Register, and Record of Solemnization

Licensed Officiant signs: Marriage Licence, Marriage Register, and Record of Solemnization

#### Please Note

The Officiant cannot leave the wedding site until all the legal documents have been signed by the couple and their designated witnesses.

Also, sometimes couples choose to sign the marriage documents after their ceremony. This is often due to a signing table not being available at a particular wedding spot, such as a boat dock of a cottage.

## **Closing Words**

The Closing Words (also known as the Closing Address, or The Closing) is a reading or statement read by the Officiant after the couple and the witnesses sign the marriage documents. It concludes the ceremony in a manner that represents the couple and their guests.

"Honey is a symbol of the sweetness in life. And so, with this dish of honey, we proclaim this day a day of great joy and celebration—a sweet day to remember."

One partner dips their finger (or a small spoon) into the honey and touches the lips of the other. The ritual is repeated with the other partner.

"As you now share this honey, so may you now share the sweetness of a shared life together. May you find life's joys doubly heartened, any bitterness sweetened, and all things hallowed by time, companionship and love"

# Sand Blending Ceremony (popular with families where children can participate)

Officiant says: \_\_\_\_\_ and \_\_\_\_ will now perform a sand blending ceremony. Today you join your separate lives together. These separate vessels of sand symbolize your separate lives, separate families, and separate sets of friends. They are all you are and all you will ever be as individuals and represent your lives before today.

As you pour your individual sands into this new vessel, they will be blended to form a new creation. Just as these grains of sand can never again be separated and poured back into their original vessels, so too will be your marriage be that of a new creation and a new life together—each respecting the uniqueness of the other but also appreciating the beauty of your new union.

#### **Pebble Ceremony**

If the wedding is to be held at a beach or by a stream or river, the Officiant may ask the guests to find a small pebble and make a wish on it for the couple.

(Alternately, small stones can be purchased from a building supply store).

The guests are then asked to place those pebbles in a large vase that the couple will keep to hold everyone's wishes for their marriage. The couple may choose to do this during the signing of their marriage documents.

The Officiant can also tell them that they can use this vase, with its special pebbles in it, to hold flowers on future anniversaries, which will remind them of their wedding day and the loving friends and family who shared it with them.

#### **Variation of Pebble Ceremony:**

Stones of Good Wishes Guests are given a flat stone at the start of the wedding ceremony along with a Sharpie marker. During the signing of the marriage documents, guests write encouraging comments or best wishes on their own stone. After the ceremony, the stones are gathered and placed in the garden of the couple's home or in a large vase. The signing of the stones may also take place during the reception, or during the time between the wedding ceremony and the reception if the couple leaves for a while to take photos.

### Wine Cup Ceremony 1

The years of life are as represented in this cup of wine poured for you to drink. This cup of life contains within it the sweet wine of happiness, joy, hope and delight. The same cup, at times, holds the bitter wine of disappointment, sorrow, grief, and despair. Those who drink deeply of life invite the full range of experiences into their being. This cup is symbolic of the pledges you make to one another to share together the fullness of life. As you drink from this cup, you acknowledge to each other that your lives, until this moment separate, have become one vessel into which all your joys and sorrows and all your hopes and fears, will be poured, and from which you will find mutual sustenance. May you always eat and drink in peace, happiness, hope and delight.

Drink now, and may the cup of your lives be sweet and full to overflowing. (Present glass to one partner and then the other.)

#### Wine Cup Ceremony 2

This cup of wine symbolizes the cup of life; it can be bitter and it can be sweet. By sharing it, you undertake to share the sweet as well as the bitter moments life brings.

Officiant presents glass to one partner and then the other.

## **Candle Lighting Ceremony 1**

For thousands of years, human beings have used candles as a source of light. Candles are also symbols of warmth, of hope, and of life itself. \_\_\_\_\_ and \_\_\_\_, you have entered into a union that is revered and valued, requiring of those who enter into it a complete and unreserved giving of self. It will bind you together in a relationship so close and so intimate that it will profoundly affect your future.

Officiant lights the candle representing the couple and says,

Would you now each, from your own candle, light a third as a symbol of your new relationship. Couple lights candle.

# **Candle Lighting Ceremony 2**

As this day you have made a new light together. May you also continue to recognize your own individuality from which your relationship has sprung. May the lights of your own unique lives continue to feed the new flame of love of your future—a future filled with hopes and disappointments, successes and failures, pleasures and pains, joys and sorrows: a future filled with warmth and love.

#### **Candle Lighting Ceremony 3**

You stand together today, not from pride but from humility as mortals, with human weaknesses and strengths, and promise trust as symbolized by this light. You will find your reward as you live each moment dedicated to a search for truth and aided by the love you have for one another.

May the gifts we receive that matter most—the food and drink before us, the cherished friends around us, and the time and space to enjoy them—Bring us the energy and inspiration to sustain us today, tomorrow, and beyond.
